FEBRUARY 13: ABSALOM JONES, Priest, 1818

Absalom Jones was born on November 6, 1746, in a house slave in Delaware. He taught himself to read out of the New Testament, among other books. When sixteen, he was sold to a store owner in Philadelphia. There he attended a night school for blacks, operated by Quakers. At twenty, he married another slave, and purchased her freedom with his earnings. Jones bought his own freedom in 1784. At St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church, he served as lay minister for its black membership. The active evangelism of Jones and that of his friend, Richard Allen, greatly increased black membership at St. George's. The alarmed vestry decided to segregate blacks into an upstairs gallery, without notifying them. During a Sunday service when ushers attempted to remove them, the blacks indignantly walked out as a body. In 1787, black Christians organized the Free African Society, the first organized Afro-American society, and Absalom Jones and Richard Allen were elected overseers. Members of the Society paid monthly dues for the benefit of those in need. The Society established communication with similar black groups in other cities. In 1792, the Society began to build a church, which was dedicated on July 17th, 1794. The African Church applied for membership in the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania on the following conditions: 1. that they be received as an organized body; 2. that they have control over their local affairs; 3. that Absalom Jones be licensed as layreader, and, if qualified, be ordained as minister. In October 1794 it was admitted as St. Thomas African Episcopal Church. Bishop White ordained Jones as deacon in 1795 and as priest on September 21, 1802. Jones was an earnest preacher. He denounced slavery, and warned the oppressors to "clean their hands of slaves." To him, God 125 was the Father, who always acted on "behalf of the oppressed and distressed." But it was his constant visiting and mild manner that made him beloved by his own flock and by the community. St. Thomas Church, Philadelphia, grew to over 500

members during its first year. Known as "the Black Bishop of the Episcopal Church," Jones was an example of persistent faith in God and in the church as God's instrument. Jones died on February 13th, 1818, in Philadelphia. *Lesser Feasts and Fasts, 2006.*

On February 13th at 10:00 a.m., the Diocese will be celebrating the Feast of Absalom Jones. The Bishop will be presiding and preaching at this liturgy. He is encouraging all to attend to celebrate the life and legacy of this "son of the Diocese of Pennsylvania." During this time of division and racial unrest please make an effort to attend. Terry sent out the information for signing up for this event in an earlier email. In addition, the Bishop has mandated that the Propers (readings and Collect) for Sunday, February 14th should be those designated for the feast of Absalom Jones.

FAITH AND BELIEF

Faith is defined as strong belief in God or in the doctrines of a religion, based on spiritual apprehension rather than proof; and, Belief is trust, faith or confidence in someone or something. Clearly, these two are inseparable. As such, the primary focus of this document stresses on Faith. It is worthy to note that this is 85% researched information and not my own thoughts. Additionally, we have had a similar message earlier; but, I strongly that now more than ever, we indeed need **FAITH.**

Faith is one of those words that is commonly used but not always understood. Some of that confusion comes from the different ways the word faith is used in everyday conversation. One common way that people use the word faith is to refer to belief in something despite lacking any evidence for it. But is that what the Bible means by faith? The answer is a resounding no! So, when the **Bible** uses the word faith, what does it mean?

The closest that the Bible comes to offering an exact definition is <u>Hebrews 11:1</u>: "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." From this particular passage we see that the central feature of faith—confidence or trust. In the Bible, the object of faith is God and his promises. A clear example of this is Abram's encounter with God in <u>Genesis 15</u>. In response to God's promise of countless descendants, Abram "believed the LORD, and he counted it to him as righteousness" (Gen 15:6). Commenting on this, the Apostle Paul writes, "No unbelief made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised" (Rom 4:20–21).

In conclusion, Faith and Belief is putting your trust in God and having confidence that he will fulfill his promises.
