Holy Name What's in a name?

On January 1st the Church observes the feast of the Holy Name of Jesus. This is an annual feast, commemorating Jesus circumcision and the reception of the name given him by the Angel. Thus, according to Luke's gospel, "After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb." And 8 days following Christmas Eve is January 1st.

So, what is the significance of Jesus' name? Why did the angel instruct Mary to give Jesus this name? According to Matthew's gospel, Jesus is given his name because he will "save his people from their sins." The Holy Name of Jesus is best rendered from the Hebrew "Yehoshua" which literally means "Yahweh is salvation." And of course, we all remember the scene from the Book of Exodus when Moses is confronted by God in the Burning Bush and God reveals to Moses that God's name is Yahweh (YHWH), which means "I am who I am" or "I will be who I will be."

The day of one's christening is a very important day in one's life, even if we do not remember it, because it is how we will be known, to others and even to ourselves, for the rest of our lives. In the ancient world, this feature of names as that "by which we are called" was extremely important because if someone knew your name they would have power to "call upon you." So when God shares God's name with Moses, he is granting an important concession to Moses. It is an act of intimacy and friendship that is surprising in the relationship between the Creator and a creature. (Consider, for example, that when Jacob wrestles with the angel—that is, with God's manifestation—the angel refuses to disclose his identity to Jacob. This refusal is a refusal to give Jacob power over him; but he exercises his power over Jacob by giving him a new identity, i.e., he renames him "Israel."
